MARY'S MONTH!

May is a time for renewal in nature and is appropriately a month dedicated to Our Lady, the Mother of New Life in Jesus Christ and our spiritual mother. I encourage you, in some particular and concrete way, to honor Mary during her month. Favorite Marian devotions include recitation of the Hail Mary, praying the *Angelus* (replaced by the *Regina Coeli* during this Easter season), wearing her Brown Scapular or Miraculous Medal, praying the rosary and honoring her through small and frequent acts of love and sacrifice.



Or make a pilgrimage (a good family activity) to pray a rosary at a Marian shrine, such as the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC. If you don't want to travel very far, plan a mini-pilgrimage to visit any image of Mary. The nearby parishes of Saint Rita and Saint Joseph have lovely outdoor statues of Our Lady. We also have a beautiful statue in our Mary Garden just outside the Basilica. You also can pray a recorded rosary any time along with Fr. David at https://stmaryoldtown.org/rosary-podcast-fr-david or on Apple Podcasts and Spotify. Another beautiful devotion is to begin your day with a prayer, traditionally called a Morning Offering, seeking Our Lady's guidance. A classic example is:

O Jesus, through the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I offer you my prayers, works, joys and sufferings of this day, for all the intentions of your Sacred Heart, in union with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass throughout the world, for the salvation of souls, the reparation of sins, the reunion of all Christians and, in particular, for the intentions of the Holy Father. Amen. (Written in 1844 by Fr. François-Xavier Gautrelet)

Friday, May 6 (First Friday), and **Saturday, May 7** (First Saturday), more than 100 second graders in our parish school and CCD program will receive their First Holy Communion. This will be a major milestone in their life-long faith journey. It is always a great joy for me to celebrate this sacrament of initiation for our young boys and girls. Their reverence as they eagerly receive Our Lord in the Holy Eucharist for the first time is truly inspiring. I pray they will continue to approach their Catholic faith, especially the Holy Eucharist, with that deep devotion for the rest of their lives.

I am so very grateful to the parents of these children – their first teachers. Hopefully, they are the best of teachers, always bearing witness to the faith by what they say and do. I thank their school teachers and the dedicated catechists who helped guide them. I also thank our Religious Education/CCD coordinators, Hilary Munger and Susan Gray, as well as our school principal, Daniel Cinalli, for their ongoing devotion to our religious formation programs.

We will welcome our First Holy Communion children to Mass for the first time on the Lord's Day at 11:30 a.m. next **Sunday, May 8**, Mother's Day, when they will participate in our annual May Crowning. What a wonderful opportunity to see these little ones so lovingly honor Our Lady!

Liturgical Calendar This Week

May 2. Saint Athanasius, Bishop and Doctor of the Church. Bishop of Alexandria for 45 years who was exiled by the Arians five times. One of four great doctors of the Eastern Church. Died in 373.

May 3. Saints Philip and James, Apostles. Philip was from Bethsaida and among the first disciples called by Jesus. According to tradition, he preached in Phrygia and died on a cross at Hierapolis. James was a leader of the Jerusalem Church; believed to have been beaten or stoned to death. Patron of the dying.

Q & A Exploring & Practicing Our Catholic Faith

Q: What is the difference between a "secular" priest and an "order" priest?

A: A **secular** (or **diocesan**) priest belongs to a specific diocese. He is bound to obey the bishop of that diocese and may not change from one diocese to another without the consent of the bishops of both dioceses. The typical parish priest, like those serving here at the Basilica, is a secular/diocesan priest. In addition to promising obedience to his bishop, the secular/diocesan priest makes a promise of celibacy.

An **order** (or **religious** or **regular**) priest is a member of religious order or congregation, such as the Benedictines, Dominicans, Franciscans, Josephites, Jesuits, etc. Order priests are referred to as "regular" because they follow the *regula*, Latin for rule or structure of life of their particular order. The order priest is bound by the three evangelical vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. He vows obedience to his superiors, and generally lives in community with his brethren.



From Your Saint Vincent de Paul Society

It was exactly two years ago when the pandemic hit and so many of our neighbors saw their savings vanish as they lost their jobs and incomes. Our daily helpline went from 10 to 20 to 30 calls per day. So many families turned



to us because the federal government had yet to provide funds to our city, which itself had no way to cope with the demands placed upon it. We became first responders to those in financial need. FROM THE ARCHIVES A periodic look at the history of our Basilica of Saint Mary parish since its founding in 1795



GEORGE BRENT, RELUCTANT REBEL

George William Brent, Esquire, born in Alexandria in August 1821, was the son of a wealthy businessman who could afford to send him to the University of Virginia to study law. Between 1842 and 1852 he practiced law in Warrenton, VA, and married Lucy Goode, daughter of the physician who developed Hot Springs, VA, as a famous sanitarium. Brent returned to Alexandria in 1853. Although Catholics were a minority in antebellum Alexandria, Brent was a prominent, respected citizen and led the city's Douglas Democrats. He served on the building committee that enlarged Saint Mary Church to accommodate 800 worshipers.



As war approached in 1860, Brent was a Unionist and expressed astonishment that secession might actually happen. In January 1861, three months before the bombardment of Fort Sumter, the Virginia legislature sent Brent as a delegate to a convention to debate secession. He was still strongly opposed to dissolution of the Union, as were a majority of Alexandrians. Yet, when the delegates voted, the ordinance of secession passed on April 17, two days after Fort Sumter.

Brent joined the state's defense forces and the governor commissioned him a major in what became the 17th Virginia Infantry. Confederate P.T.G. Beauregard asked to have Brent on his staff, where he handled legal matters for the Army of Mississippi. He served as chief-of-staff for Beauregard and his successor, General Braxton Bragg. Brent's church membership may have played a role in his

close bond with Beauregard, also a Catholic. His faith also may have helped him bond with the 17th Virginia regiment, which contained many Irish Catholics from Saint Mary parish.

In the waning days of the war, Brent reunited with Beauregard as the Confederacy collapsed. Brent was in Raleigh when he learned of Lee's surrender at Appomattox. As a member of Beauregard's staff, Brent surrendered and was paroled on April 26, 1865. He returned to Alexandria to resume his career of public service. In 1870 he was severely injured when a gallery overcrowded with spectators collapsed in the Court of Appeals in Richmond, falling into the House of Delegates below the court. Brent, sitting in the House chamber, was severely injured by falling timbers and never fully recovered. He died on January 2, 1872, at the age of 50, and is buried in Saint Mary Cemetery.
