THE BAPTISM OF OUR LORD, JANUARY 9



Today, **Sunday, January 9**, our Christmas season concludes with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. With His baptism in the Jordan River by Saint John the Baptist, Jesus entered into His public ministry. John was the man who proclaimed Christ as the Lamb of God, whose way he had prepared, and the Triune nature of the Godhead was revealed.

At Christ's baptism, the Holy Spirit descended upon Him; at our baptism, the Trinity made its home in our soul. At His baptism, Christ was proclaimed the Beloved Son of the Father; at our baptism, we became the adopted sons and daughters of God. At His baptism, Jesus prayed; after our baptism, we must pray to avoid sin.

Christ, of course, was free of all sin and did not need to be baptized. Rather, He was baptized "to cleanse the waters, so that those waters, cleansed by the flesh of Christ which knew no sin, might have the power of baptism," according to Saint Ambrose of Milan. Through the merits Christ gained for us at His baptism, our own baptism cleanses us of all sin, including Original Sin and any sin we may have committed up until that moment.

Do you know your baptism date? Do you know the name of the priest or deacon who baptized you? If not, ask your parents or other family members or family friends who were there. Or contact the church where you were baptized to ask them to check their records. Your baptism is a milestone to be celebrated with great joy each year. Afterall, it's the day you became a child of God!

ORDINARY TIME BEGINS MONDAY, JANUARY 10

The liturgical cycle of the Church divides the calendar year into seasons, each with its own tone and theological emphasis. These seasons can be signified by different ways of decorating a church, lectionary readings, themes for preaching and the colors of the vestments worn by the clergy.

Tomorrow, **Monday, January 10**, we begin "Ordinary Time" in the liturgical cycle and the priests will wear green vestments. Ordinary Time is the period outside other major seasons (Lent/Easter and Advent/Christmas). In Latin, it is called *Tempus Per Annum* or "time throughout the year." Ordinary Time now continues through Tuesday, March 1, the day before Ash Wednesday and the beginning of the Lenten season. It resumes when the Easter season ends on Monday, June 6, the day following Pentecost Sunday.

Ordinary Time is far from ordinary. During the "green" weeks, the Gospel readings we hear at Mass help us enter more deeply into the life and teachings of Christ. Reflecting on the readings and following Him in our daily lives throughout the year can guide us to make the ordinary truly extraordinary.

Liturgical Calendar This Week

January 9: The Baptism of the Lord. Christ humbles Himself to receive John's baptism of repentance, not to be purified but to purify each of us.

January 13: Saint Hilary, Bishop and Doctor of the Church. Married, convert from paganism. Bishop of Portiers in 353 during the Arian heresy. Exiled to Turkey for defending the orthodox faith. Known for his work, *On the Trinity*, and his commentaries on the Psalms and Matthew's Gospel. Declared a Doctor of the Church in 1851.

Q & A Exploring & Practicing Our Catholic Faith

Q: Is my confession valid if I don't remember exactly how many times I committed a particular sin?

A: It depends. The important thing is not just to remember the number of times but to be truly sorry for all sins committed by confessing everything you can remember, to the best of your ability. You also must intend to do better, avoid situations that might lead you to sin again and then, right away, perform any penance given by the priest.

The venerable old *Baltimore Catechism* tells us: "If we cannot remember the number of our sins, we should tell the number as nearly as possible, and say how often we may have sinned in a day, a week, or a month, and how long the habit or practice has lasted." (Q792)

On the other hand, if you purposely omit confessing a serious sin or purposely do not tell the priest how often that sin occurred, then the confession is not valid. As the old saying goes, "God will not heal what we do not reveal." (See *Catechism of the Catholic Church* 1456)



A periodic look at the history of our Basilica of Saint Mary parish since its founding in 1795



BOB McCASLIN

For many years, Robert "Bob" McCaslin (1917-2014) was among Saint Mary's most dedicated volunteers. A devout, 60-year member of the parish, Bob had been a special agent with the FBI. After he retired, he kept busy by renovating and remodeling houses in Alexandria. Bob and his wife, Wanda Larson McCaslin, lived on the 200 block of South Fairfax Street, just a block from the parish rectory. Wanda was a Saint Mary parish secretary for many years before her death in 1994.




Bob's expertise in construction served him well as president of Saint Mary's Saint Vincent de Paul Society, which renovated and maintained a number of houses in the parish for the poor. He also served as an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion and lector here

for many years. He was a member of the parish council and helped with many church fundraising campaigns. He helped found Bishop Ireton High School and was actively involved there and at Saint Mary School.



No matter what the pastor needed, he could always rely on Bob to help. One humorous incident involved a favor requested by Father Leo Massei, Saint Mary's pastor from 1959 to 1965. The Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart, the religious sisters whose convent occupied one of the brick townhouses across the street from the church, told Father Massei their roof was leaking onto a sister's bed! Father Massei immediately dispatched Bob to check it out. While Bob was there, he also took a look at the rest of the house to see if anything else needed to be repaired. He discovered the rubber gasket around their refrigerator door was missing. Father Massei told him

to go to Sears and buy them a nice, new refrigerator. When Bob returned to the convent to tell the sisters the good news, their first reaction was surprising. They were thrilled, of course, but they had been using the faulty appliance as their kitchen nightlight! When the new refrigerator arrived, the ever-resourceful Bob McCaslin brought them a new nightlight from Murphy's dime store on King Street. – *Kitty Guy, Parish Historian*
