FIRST SUNDAY IN ADVENT

Sunday, November 28, is the First Sunday of Advent, a four-week season of hopeful longing, joyful expectation and prayerful penance. Advent connects us spiritually with God's plan of redemption through Jesus Christ as we prepare for His coming as an infant at Christmas and His Coming as our Redeemer at the end of time.

A popular Advent tradition for the entire family is the Advent wreath, typically a circle of evergreen with four candles. The first candle is lit on the First Sunday of Advent as we pray or reflect on Sacred Scripture. The second, third and fourth candles are lit on the following Sundays. Three candles are usually violet, symbolizing the prayer, penance, preparatory sacrifices



and good works we should undertake during Advent. One candle is rosecolored and is lit on the Third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, a day of rejoicing as the birth of Christ draws near.

We will bless and light our Basilica Advent wreath at Mass this weekend. In your home, an Advent wreath can be blessed by a parent or other family member. You can find prayers for blessings your wreath at https:// www.usccb.org/prayers/blessing-advent-wreath.

ADORATION TO END ABORTION

Catholics across the country will participate in Eucharistic Adoration to End Abortion on **Wednesday**, **December 1**, as the U.S. Supreme Court hears *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health*, a case that could affect efforts to overturn *Roe v. Wade*, the federal law that legalized abortion in this country.

Here at the Basilica, the Blessed Sacrament is exposed on the altar for Eucharistic Adoration **each Wednesday** following the 12:10 p.m. Mass until conclusion of a Holy Hour at 8:30 p.m. This week, on December 1, I encourage you to pray, at home or in the Basilica during Adoration, that the sacredness of every human life be protected and upheld, both in law and in culture.



Q & A Exploring & Practicing Our Catholic Faith

Q: Why is the Holy Spirit represented by a dove?

A: We can thank our Jewish roots for the dove symbol. The Babylonian *Talmud* compares the Spirit of God that hovers over the waters at creation to a dove: "And the spirit of God hovered over the face of the waters— like a dove which hovers over her young without touching [them]." In another, Old Testament example, a dove was sent out by Noah in search of land after the waters of the flood stopped. "The dove came back to him in the evening, and lo, in her mouth a freshly plucked olive leaf" (Genesis 8:11). This episode is directly connected to the baptism of Jesus as the flood is seen in Christianity as a type or prefigurement of baptism.

So, by the time of the New Testament, doves were already very much associated with God and His Spirit. Early Christians adopted this imagery and began depicting the Holy Spirit almost exclusively as a dove. In Christian art, the dove is shown at the baptism of Jesus and other pivotal events, such as the Annunciation when Mary was informed she would bear the Son of God. In fact, some of the first tabernacles containing the Eucharist were made in the form of a dove suspended over the altar.



November 30. Saint Andrew, Apostle. 1st century.
Brother of Simon Peter, disciple of John the Baptist. Tradition holds that he preached north of the Black Sea and in Greece. Died bound to an X-shaped cross at Patras, Greece.
December 3. Saint Francis Xavier, Priest. Died in 1552 at age 46 on the island of Sancion off the China coast.
From Navarre; one of the founding Jesuits; preached in India, Sri Lanka, Malaysia and Japan.

— December 4. Saint John Damascene, Priest and Doctor of the Church. Born in Damascus, a Muslim city; died in 749. First of the East to formulate a comprehensive synthesis of Christian dogma. Defended the veneration of images. Composed hymns, preached many homilies in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary, especially her Assumption. Last of the Greek Fathers.

FROM THE ARCHIVES A periodic look at the history of our Basilica of Saint Mary parish

since its founding in 1795



CATHOLICISM IN THE COLONIES

More than two-and-a-half centuries before our Saint Mary parish was founded in 1795, Roman Catholics in England suffered periodic persecution after King Henry VIII declared himself head of the Church of England in 1534. English Catholics were treated like second-class citizens at best. One penal law required every adult male to attend at least one Anglican service each month or pay a one-shilling fine, equivalent to more than \$100 today...a substantial amount for most people.

This anti-Catholic attitude was transferred to the American colonies, including Maryland and Virginia. In 1629, Sir George Calvert (c. 1580-1632), a convert to Catholicism and a government official under King James I, sought a land grant to establish a settlement for Catholics in Virginia. But he was informed that Catholics were not welcome in Virginia!

Most Englishmen simply accepted the Anglican Church. Yet, some Catholics – representing all levels of society - remained true to their faith. They were called "recusants" because they were forced to withdraw or recuse themselves from public life and many professions. For example, they could not practice law, were required to pay taxes to support the Church of England and were effectively deprived the right to vote. Later,

under the Stuart Kings James I and Charles, in the 1610s to the early 1640s, Catholics were better tolerated and enforcement of the tyrannical penal laws was suspended.

During these turbulent times, a small, tightly knit and devout Catholic community in Maryland persevered. Mass was celebrated and the sacraments were administered in private homes. Their priests, mostly Jesuits, were able to also serve Catholics across the Potomac River in Alexandria. But it wasn't easy. Young men desiring to become priests had to travel to Europe to study. At one point, Maryland enacted a law limiting the right to leave the colony and study abroad. There are accounts of prospective seminarians sneaking out of Maryland to cross the Potomac to Alexandria, under the cover of darkness, to gain passage on ships to pursue studies in Europe. This made it very difficult for newly ordained priests to enter Maryland and thus minister to Catholics in the Virginia colony. Despite the barriers, priests from Maryland came to Alexandria to celebrate Mass, mostly in secret. When freedom of religion finally was proclaimed in Virginia in 1786, Catholics in Alexandria could finally practice their faith openly. - Kitty Guy, Parish Historian
